

The Formation of Citizens for Squirrel Point

'Citizens for Squirrel Point' is a newly formed Maine nonprofit corporation organized for the following limited purpose:

To ensure that Squirrel Point Light in Arrowsic, Maine is used and maintained in accordance with the terms of Federal law, State law, local law, and the covenants in its 1998 deed from the U.S. Government to preserve the lighthouse property for the public benefit.

There are no membership dues (although contributions are welcome), and membership is open to individuals and organizations who support this purpose. Verrill & Dana, a Portland based law firm, will represent 'Citizens for Squirrel Point' on a pro bono basis. Brian Detwiler, Roger Heard, Lee Johnson, Fred Kahrl and Will Neilson have agreed to serve as its initial directors.

Volunteer Fire Department News

Q: Don't we have a contract with Bath to provide Arrowsic with fire

protection?

A: Yes. In 2001 Arrowsic contracted with the Bath Fire Department for primary response to structural fires, at a rate of \$5,000 per year plus hourly charges for calls exceeding one hour in duration. The contract is reviewable annually under its existing terms through early April 2006. The Bath Fire Department responded to two calls in Arrowsic in 2001, and two calls in 2002. Arrowsic also has a separate contract with the City of Bath for the provision of ambulance services (charged on a per call basis).

Reminder: Burn Permits

Burn permits are required for any open outside fire. State law allows permitted burning weekdays after 5 P.M. and any time on weekends. To obtain a burn permit, call Ike Heffron at 371-9093, Donna Blanchette at 882-4118, or Mike Kreindler at 442-7443.

February/March Calls

Indira Gowell has steadfastly controlled the middle all season for the Waynflete girls' basketball team, and last Thursday was no exception. Gowell had 12 points and 12 rebounds as the Flyers beat Woodland 39-36 in the state Class D final, ending the Dragons' two-year reign as state champions. Indira Gowell was Waynflete's go-to player in a state title season. It was a typical effort for Gowell, a 6-foot-
