CURBSIDE RECYCLING STARTS JAN. 1

On Friday, January 5, and every two weeks thereafter, residents will no longer have to take the majority of recyclables to the Town Hall.

Recyclables can now be placed out with regular trash for curbside pickup by T & R Associates. This new service will be at no extra cost to the town. Here are some of the details, a separate brochure will be delivered to your house soon:

PICKUP AT CURBSIDE:

- * newspapers/magazines/ phonebooks
- * clear glass
- * tin cans
- *#2 plastic
- * corrugated cardboard

TAKE TO TOWN HALL

- * mixed paper (cereal boxes, envelopes, six-pack cardboard containers)
- * hygrade office paper

Each item must be separated in containers of your choosing -- reusable boxes, crates, bins, pails, brown bags, or Shaw's plastic bags (T & R will recycle these). Materials should be placed out for pickup before 7 a.m. For recyclables not included in curbside pickup, there will be clearly marked bins at the Town Hall for mixed paper.

Hygrade paper should be handled as in the past: placed in bags or boxes and put in the small white shed.

PROGRESS REPORT FROM ARROWSIC FIRE PROTECTION COMMITTEE

The Fire Protection Committee has, since July, discussed several areas of concern relating to fire protection for Arrowsic. Meetings between selectmen, Arrowsic Fire Chief Don Bryant, and the Bath City Manager and Interim Fire Chief have already taken place and we are attempting to meet with the fire chiefs of Georgetown and Woolwich. Some of the concerns are: the cost of providing service, response times, mutual aid for all towns involved, and Arrowsic residents' participation in the volunteer fire department.

The committee hired Neil Courtney, technical service specialist for Maine Fire Training and Education, which does most of the training for firefighters in the state and also assesses a town's fire protection needs. Mr. Courtney's assessment of Arrowsic's situation was that the town should look to greatly improving our facilities and equipment or find another way to deliver fire protection service. Given the small size and limited resources of the town, and the few residents who are actually participants in the volunteer fire department, the committee feels that contracting the fire protection should be considered.

Towards that end the committee is now in the process of discussing with Bath, Woolwich and Georgetown the joint fire protection needs of all, including the possibility of contracting our service with one of those towns. Of course, the primary goal is to maintain or improve the fire protection service that Arrowsic now gets as part of the Sagadahoc County Mutual Aid Fire Protection System and with our own Volunteer Fire Department.
